New Course, Pending Faculty Approval. Explores the past of Latin America and the major civilizations that existed prior to European arrival and colonization. Extending from Mesoamerica through the Southern Andes, topics covered include the monumental structures, belief systems, and trade networks that made sure an entire continent was interconnected for millennia. This course also looks at the ways in which European colonialism has shaped the perception of these civilizations and how modern pseudoarchaeology continues to deny the accomplishments of indigenous cultures.

When we hear about climate change in the American media, the coverage tends to be oriented towards the impacts on us," but we hear less about the global & planetary consequences. What will the results be in China? In India? In the Maldives? This course will address the question of planetary consequences of climate change using fiction and film as a means of representing the past and present, and imagining possible futures beyond a US-centered framework. We'll also have a fair amount of nonfiction reading on this issue -- both scientific accounts that help elucidate the scale of the problem, as well as some accounts that might be understood as climate change skepticism. In addition to thinking carefully about what the data shows and what it does not, it seems important to understand why poorer countries in particular have been slow to sign on to fighting climate change. Readings and films will focus on the experiences of people from the Global South as well as minoritized communities within the U.S. Films will include experimental works and documentaries exploring climate change in India and parts of Africa, along with popular films like "Don't Look Up" and "Snowpiercer."

The course serves as an introduction to the sociological study of the environment. In this course, students will learn about basic concepts in sociology and apply them to environmental sociology, the study of the relationship between human societies and the larger natural environment. This course will take a critical perspective to examine topics such as capitalism's impact on the environment, environmental justice, climate change, environmental movements and the possibility for social change.
